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Program

During the course, learners will gain an excellent understanding of animal psychology and learn how to work with dogs of different breeds, ages, and temperaments. We teach learners how to train dogs humanely and reach their training goals efficiently and effectively.

Course Overview

The nationally accredited 22542VIC Certificate III in Dog Behaviour and Training is ideal for individuals seeking a career in dog training. It not only provides a pathway to a rewarding profession but also offers an excellent opportunity to enrich personal understanding and knowledge of canine behaviour.

This course is delivered using a blended mode of delivery that includes classroom, online, and workplace delivery methodologies over a 12-month duration. This mode of delivery promotes collaborative learning, encourages peer group discussions, supports networking, relationship development and building within the industry.

The learner is required to make every effort to participate in online sessions, scheduled workshops, lectures, and practical training sessions. To be deemed competent in the qualification, a minimum attendance of 80% must be met. For any missed sessions, the learner must purchase (if available) the corresponding online lectures for that session or attend a lecture/workshop makeup session(s).

Local Melbourne Course

The local Melbourne-based course is conducted during weekends outside regular business hours. The face-to-face delivery provides support for those who may require additional support, those with challenges in time management or those who may struggle with self-discipline and motivation to successfully complete their studies.

Distance Course

The Distance Learning Course is suitable for learners who prefer independent study. The program spans a duration of 12 months and encompasses online delivery and study, via the Precise Training website Moodle portal. Learners are required to attend two blocks of practical training at a kennel facility in their chosen state in Melbourne, Western Australia, and the Sunshine Coast.

The practical training provides opportunities for learners to consolidate the knowledge they have obtained online to develop their skills in a real-life training environment.

Entry Requirements

For learners who are under 18 years of age, the approval of the parent/guardian is required for the enrolment to proceed. The minimum age requirement to enrol is 16 years of age and must be Australian/NZ Citizen or Permanent Resident of Australia.

- Ownership or consistent access to at least one dog is required to ensure successful completion of the course.
- Learners must meet minimum computer / digital literacy standards as determined by Precise Training and have unrestricted access to the internet and an email account. Computer / digital literacy standards are the computer skills required to engage in training. The minimum standards include:
 - Make, save and find files;
 - Download and upload documents;
 - Use the internet to find information and send emails;
 - Open and save documents;
 - Use simple text skills such as typing, formatting and printing; and
 - Resolve minor application problems.
- Learners are required to undertake a Language, Literacy, Numeracy and Digital (LLND) review using LLND Robot prior to enrolment being accepted by Precise Training;
- An interview will be conducted with a prospective learner upon completion of the LLND quiz if results exhibit below level requirements of this course. The interview is conducted to ensure that the prospective learner fully comprehends the course outline and the associated duties. This interview serves as an opportunity for both the learner and Precise Training offering the course to clarify any expectations, requirements, or potential challenges related to the course as well as any reasonable adjustments that may need to be implemented.
- A learner must supply Precise Training with a Unique Student Identifier (USI) should their enrolment be successful. (Details on how to obtain a USI will be provided on enrolment); and
- A learner must be able to undertake the required hours for this course.

Please note: Precise Training does not market, promote, deliver, assess or issue full qualifications for overseas learners. Precise Training must verify that said learner is not an 'Overseas Learner'. Access to a Dog

Throughout the course, learners **must have regular access to a dog/s for training.**

This includes the general practice of training techniques learned during the program as well as the completion of practical milestones and associated assessment activities.

The following should be considered when selecting dogs for use during the course:

- Regular access each week, for approximately 30 minutes per session
- Training for some assessments activities may be conducted over several months; therefore, consistent and sustained access to a dog/s is required.
- Serious / complex behaviour problems may require increased training time and, in some cases, may impact on learner's ability to meet training goals.
- Dogs with health complications and / or elderly dogs may require increased training time and, in some cases, may not be suitable to perform some assessment activities; and
- Some assessments activities require learners to take their dogs to unfamiliar environments and perform their skills in settings with medium to high levels of distraction, such as areas with nearby people, other dogs, or loud machinery, with significant reactivity/aggression / timidity issues may require increased training time and, in some cases, may affect a learner's ability to meet training goals.

Local Melbourne Course

Theory classes and practical workshops are held at Wellington Park Kennels in Lysterfield or Bayswater. These are compulsory requirements of the course which may require up to two (2) weekends a month. To assist the learner in planning their attendance, the dates will be available on acceptance of the course.

Additionally, there is a requirement to complete a compulsory 100 hours practical workplace experience at work placement/dog training centre located throughout Australia. The work placement/dog training centre must meet requirements of Precise Training and have suitably qualified staff to mentor the learners.

For the learner to reach their 100 hours, the learner will need to attend a dog training centre on a regular weekly basis. If the learner is sick, on holidays, or cannot attend for any other reason, they are required to make up the hours on another day or location.

Distance Learning Course

The practical component is completed in two compulsory block training sessions. Learners are allocated to one of Precise Training's locations. The number of learners attending each block option is strictly limited; therefore, it is recommended reserving a place as soon as possible. Please note: a place can only be reserved once the Enrolment Form and administration fee has been received by Precise Training.

Additionally, learners are required to attend 100 hours of work placement training during their course.

This work placement takes place at a dog training centre of the learners' choosing. This unique feature allows learners to tailor their practical experience to their specific interests and career goals. The 12-month timeline ensures a comprehensive exploration of the curriculum, while the hands-on work placement adds a practical dimension, reinforcing theoretical knowledge and preparing learners for a successful transition into the dog training industry.

For the learner to reach their 100 hours, the learner will need to attend a dog training centre on a regular weekly basis. If the learner is sick, on holidays, or cannot attend for any other reason, they are required to make up the hours on another day or location.

Block Training Sessions

Learners are expected to attend the Block Training sessions according to the schedule outlined in their programs. Workshops are usually conducted between the hours of 8:30 am and 5:00pm and span eight (8) consecutive days.

Learners will be given no less than 12 weeks' notice in writing of practical block training sessions. The learner must confirm in writing within 7 days of receiving notice of their attendance to Practical Block Training.

These sessions focus on the development of practical handling/training skills and consolidate the theory learned in the online learning materials. The training is conducted with dogs unfamiliar to learners to provide learners the opportunity to expand their experience in a challenging but supportive learning environment.

At times during the block training sessions, specialised classes are conducted online to provide further depth and expertise in specific areas.

Please Note: Learners are not permitted to bring their dogs to Block Training UNLESS ADVISED.

***If you have been permitted to bring your dog to Block training, it must be a minimum of 16 weeks old (4 months) and you must present your C5 vaccination certificate upon arrival.**

Block Training Locations

Melbourne Block Training

The Melbourne Block Training sessions are located in Lysterfield or Bayswater Victoria. Blocks in Melbourne run for 8 consecutive days for each block. This venue is available to learners from all the states. Learners are responsible for organising their own transport, accommodation, and meals.

Sunshine Coast Block Training

The Sunshine Coast Block Training sessions are located in Verrierdale, QLD. Block Training in QLD run for eight (8) consecutive days for each block.

This venue is available to learners from all the states. Learners are responsible for organising their transport, accommodation, and meals.

Western Australia Block Training

Training in WA run for eight (8) consecutive days for each block.

This venue is available to learners from all the states. Learners are responsible for organising their transport, accommodation, and meals.

Approximate Weekly Hours of Study

In the early phase of the course, learners should anticipate dedicating approximately 10 to 15 hours per week to engage in theoretical coursework to meet the course requirements and associated written assessments. As the course advances, this commitment is expected to increase to 20 to 25 hours weekly, as learners actively engage in hands-on practical training sessions with their own dogs. This will be supported and reinforced by additional reading and theoretical assessments.

If there are factors that could potentially affect the learning process for the learner, such as health issues or time constraints, it is important to acknowledge that the required study duration might need to be extended accordingly. Similarly, if a dog encounters behavioural or health-related challenges that may affect its training performance and successful participation, additional time and attention may be necessary to effectively address these issues.

100 Hours Practical Training

This course is conducted over a 12-month period with a requirement of 100 hours practical training of work placement that is additional to workshop and theory lectures.

This unique feature allows participants to tailor their practical experience to their specific interests and career goals. The 12-month timeline ensures an in-depth exploration of the course material, while the hands-on work placement adds a practical dimension, reinforcing theoretical knowledge and preparing learners for a successful transition into the dog training industry.

A learner will be required to source and participate in work placement at a dog training facility of their choosing. However, this must be a facility where dog training is being conducted and cannot be a care facility such as a doggy day care.

Students may wish to attend more than one centre to complete their hours. The hours completed must be signed off by the trainer of the facility using the *100 Hours Practical Training Record Form* that is located on the Moodle portal.

If a learner is currently employed or volunteers in a dog training facility, they are able to complete their 100 hours practical training with their employer.

For learners enrolled in the Distance Learning course, block training sessions do not form part of the 100 hours practical training requirement.

For learners enrolled in the Local Melbourne course, theory lectures and workshops do not form part of the 100 hours practical training requirement.

Assessments

The course incorporates a combination of theoretical and practical assessments, evaluating both knowledge and skills.

All theoretical information is obtained through Precise Trainings online Moodle system. These consist of all the learner textbooks and resources required to complete the online quizzes and assessments.

Training plans, reports, and all critical dates are available through Precise Trainings Moodle system as well as all assessor feedback that the learner may need to view.

Learners are required to showcase their competency with practical assessments at a training centre or kennel facility. Additionally, learners must demonstrate the skills they have taught their own dogs at home, including but not limited to complex skills, targeting, assistance dog skills, or scent detection. These must be uploaded through Precise Trainings Moodle system with a unique learner login provided at time of enrolment. If learners are deemed Not Yet Competent for any assessment activity, they have the opportunity to resubmit at a later date. Assistance and support are available to those learners who require additional tuition.

Theory Component

The theoretical component of this course provides learners with knowledge required to train dogs in a successful and humane manner. Learners are provided with access to all the information which provides the foundation for learning and preparing them for practical training with dogs.

The program incorporates flexible study options as a primary component, empowering learners to adapt their schedules to accommodate personal and work commitments. This flexibility is designed to meet the diverse needs of learners, allowing them to engage with the course at a pace that aligns with their individual circumstances.

Precise Training ensures that learners do not miss out on any of the training and assessment experience or the practical elements of the course, where they receive the opportunity to put principles into practice. Precise Training has the right control measures in place to administer quality online learning and assessments, without compromising the integrity of the accredited course outcomes.

Practical Training Component

This hands-on component is an integral part of the curriculum, allowing learners to apply theoretical knowledge to real-life situations by putting principles into practice. Precise Training ensures a diverse experience by offering practical training with a variety of dogs which may include various ages, breeds, and temperaments. Instalment Plan

10 Month Instalment Plan

The payment structure for the course allows for the convenient option of distributing the fees across 10 instalments, providing flexibility and ease of financial management throughout the duration of course.

Recognition of Prior Learning

Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) is available to learners with past or current experience in dog training. This generally applies to individuals who work with dogs in a professional capacity (get paid for their services or have employment in the industry), as well as those who train or instruct on a volunteer basis. This does not apply to someone who has conducted obedience training with their own dogs. However, if the potential applicant has achieved high levels of competitive obedience/agility and/or has trained own dogs in specialist fields (search and rescue, assistance roles, scent detection, etc.), they are encouraged to apply for or discuss their case with a staff member.

All learners seeking Recognition of Prior Learning are required to complete an RPL application attaching supporting evidence to meet the competency requirements. Evidence may include: certificates, educational transcripts, photos, video footage, workplace documents, letters from their employer and Statutory Declarations. Detailed evidence requirements will be provided to the applicant, once it is established that there may be sufficient prior learning to warrant a recognition application. All RPL applications commence with a competency discussion with a qualified assessor.

All applications for RPL must be completed PRIOR to course commencement at the time of enrolment.

If the learner is granted RPL, the learner may be eligible for a reduction of practical training requirements, the theoretical requirements, or both. The learner is still welcome to attend the associated classes / workshops, even if they have received recognition for this subject /unit.

Credit Transfers
